Background


- Born in Louisiana and went to the University of Georgia

- She often uses old photos and videos, found objects, "discarded materials," and images from outdated popular culture




- Dreams

The Red Book

- Explores themes of memory, loss, identity, language, and how language influences or creates identity
- References myths about how different languages were created by breaking apart a person's body
- Inspired by a book called "The Man With a Shattered World" by H.R. Luria, which is about a man who loses his memory but tries to regain it by writing his own life story. Geiser was "intrigued by this tale, and its implications regarding the essential mutability of narrative, memory, and identity" (Holly Willis)


